



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PREFACE

PILDAT has been assessing the quality of democracy in Pakistan since 2002. In 2013, for the first time, PILDAT commissioned a nationwide poll to gauge public opinion on quality of democracy. A country-wide nationally-representative survey on assessing public opinion on quality of democracy was undertaken in September 2013 upon the completion of 100 days of National and Provincial Assemblies and Governments, elected through the May 2013 General Election.

PILDAT also undertook another country-wide, nationally representative survey on assessing the quality of democracy in Pakistan upon the completion of the 1st year of National and Provincial Assemblies and Government in office in May 2014, which was conducted from July 16, 2014 to August 06, 2014.

This time around as well, upon the completion of the 2nd year of National and Provincial Assemblies and Governments in office in May 2015, PILDAT has once again carried out a *public opinion survey* to gauge public opinion across the country on quality of democracy. The nationwide poll was conducted during June 02-12, 2015 with a sample size of 3231 citizens throughout Pakistan.

PILDAT carried out the Nationwide Poll and commissioned Dr. Ijaz Shafi Gilani, as the pioneering political pollster in Pakistan and as one of the most experienced and eminent political scientist and analyst of Pakistan, to write this report on the basis of the poll results.

This report presents an analysis of the public opinion obtained on core indicators on quality of democracy. The respondents for the survey included 3231 citizens from rural and urban areas from all the four provinces of Pakistan. The fieldwork for the report was done in face-to-face interviews in respondents' homes. The sample is also based on a cross-section of various age, income, education and language groups of the population. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 3-5\%$ at 95% confidence level.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY A RY

After Two Years of Rough Ride, Democracy Emerges Un-Bruised

After two years of rough ride, the democratic system in Pakistan has emerged as un-bruised. The survey by Pakistan's most prominent democracy watcher, PILDAT, shows that support for democracy has consolidated and 66% of the respondents look favourably upon the quality of democracy in the country at the end of the 2nd Year of the Federal and Provincial Governments. This is a significant improvement from the 56% of the respondents who looked favourably upon the quality of democracy in Pakistan at the end of the 1st year of the Federal and Provincial Governments in May 2014.

In contrast, only 20% of the respondents say that the country would be better off if the Military were to run it. This is not a mean achievement for a country that has spent several decades under military rule during its 68 years of history as an independent nation.

These public views are part of a Nationwide Public Opinion Poll by PILDAT on assessing citizens' views on Quality of Democracy in Pakistan during the 2nd year of the Government which came into being after the May 2013 General Election.

In interpreting its survey on performance of democracy, PILDAT believes that popular support for democracy as a system has come to age and consolidated during the past two years. The PILDAT assessment is based on survey findings which show that scepticism about Electoral Fraud has nearly halved from its peak of 50% a year ago to around 30%; political parties have gained respectability and popular opinion across political divide has rated democratic governance favourably specially in the provinces of Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP). Together they constitute 70% of the nation's population.

A substantial 80% of the respondents say that holding Local Government elections nationwide are somewhat to very important. Only 11% of the respondents believe that holding these elections is not very important or not important at all. Public opinion in favour of holding Local Government elections has seen a clear increase, as by the end of the 1st year of the Federal and Provincial Governments in May 2014, this number stood at 71%, whereas 27% of the respondents believed that holding these elections is not very important at all.

On the other hand, 72% of respondents believe that elected Local Governments are somewhat to very important in solving the problems faced by Pakistani Citizens, whereas by the end of the 1st year, only 65% of the respondents believed this to be the case. Only 19% asserted that elected Local Governments are not important in resolving the problems faced by citizens by the end of the 2nd year.

The survey results are released from a two-part PILDAT survey covering separately **Quality of Governance** and **Quality of Democracy**. The two-part public opinion survey was commissioned by PILDAT upon the completion of the 1st year of National and Provincial Assemblies and Governments in office in May 2014 to gauge public opinion across the country on quality of governance and democracy. The nationwide poll was conducted again during **June 02-12**, **2015 following the completion of the 2nd year of the National and Provincial Assemblies and Governments**. The Nationwide Poll was conceived and undertaken by PILDAT.

The PILDAT survey shows that popular grievances are getting pinned down on the poor effectiveness of bureaucracy, with only **33%** of the respondents rating positively its effectiveness. On the other hand, **56%** of the respondents stated that they reposed high to very high level of trust in their favourite political party.


In addition to the Red points (an Approval Rating of less than 50%) on effectiveness of bureaucracy, the Report identifies popular concerns about loss of sovereignty as one of the sore points in popular evaluation of the current system of government. Only 43% of the respondents believe that the current system of government has succeeded to safeguard national sovereignty from foreign encroachments whereas for the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, this Approval Rating stood at 40%.


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Overall Verdict on Democracy in 2nd Year of Elected Governments

Overall, Pakistani public remains confident and optimistic about the democratic system in the country. In order to track the Public Opinion on the issue of Quality of Democracy 11 Indicators were designed. PILDAT used these same 11 Indicators in the 2014 Report as well as in the current report. 

High Scoring Indicators

When asked to assess performance on these 11 core indicators of quality of democracy during the past one year, there emerged **6 indicators with approval ratings of more than 50%**. The scorecard (Table 2) shows the Federal Government's Approval Rating, i.e. Sum of Responses in Category 'Approved a lot' and 'Approved Somewhat', on the core democracy indicators. A low approval rating which is less than 50% shows that more people have disapproved or chose to remain silent on the issue. Similarly, a rating of more than 50% implies that the majority population expressed its approval on the issue.

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- i. Overall Quality of Democracy (66%)
- ii. Independence of Media (For the Government's Performance: 64%; For the Media's Performance: 64%)
- iii. Effectiveness of the Supreme Court (For the Government's Performance: 55%; For the Supreme Court's Performance: 56%)
- iv. Trust in Favourite Political Party (56%)
- v. Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet (52%)
- vi. Democratic Oversight of the Security Sector (51%)

Of particular significance is the public's high rating on the **Overall Quality of Democracy** Indicator. This holistic indicator measures the public's level of satisfaction, as well as their assessment of how well democracy is functioning in the country. This high rating is reflective of the growing trust and confidence that the people of Pakistan have begun forming with a democratic system of governance.

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


Figure 3: Low Scoring Indicators: Approval Ratings 2015

Notwithstanding this overall positivity in democratic assessment, the **5 out of the 11** Indicators assessed in this public opinion poll received approval ratings below 50%:

- i. Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy (For the Government's Performance "34%: for the Bureaucracy's Perfomance: 33%)
- ii. Safeguarding Sovereignty of the State (43%)
- iii. Transfers of Powers at the Provincial Level (44%)
- iv. Respect for Human Rights (47%); and
- v. Effectiveness of the National Assembly (For the Government's Peformance:48%; For the National Assembly's Performance: 45%)

Provincial Verdict on Democracy in 2nd Year of Elected Governments

Punjab & Balochistan: Provincial scores from Balochistan and Punjab are somewhat similar in their approval ratings on Quality of Democracy questions. Overall, people from Balochistan and Punjab hold less favourable opinions of the quality of democratic functioning nationwide.

Similarly, people from Balochistan and Punjab had lower approval ratings in their assessment of the **Overall Quality of Democracy** in the country compared to other provinces; **Balochistan**, with the approval rating of 54% in fact provides the least favourable opinion on quality of democracy, followed by 65% in Punjab.

KP has emerged as the province with the greatest number of high approval rates for the democratic system in the country. More than 50% approval ratings were given by the people of KP on the current democratic system on **10 out of 11** assessed indicators.

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The people of KP gave the **highest approval rating** to **Trust in Favourite Political Parties (82%)**. This high approval rating is indicative of the robust trust that the political parties in this region have been able to generate. The only indicator with **low approval rating** from the province was **Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy (44%)**.

Sindh on the other hand has provided moderate approval ratings on almost all the indicators when compared to the other three provinces. In the Overall Quality of Democracy assessment, Sindh generated an approval rating of 69% compared to 54% in Balochistan, 65% in Punjab and 73% in KP.

National Evaluation of Democracy

In Table 2, we have also ranked different indicators from highest approval rating to lowest approval rating, in order to outline areas where the Federal Government has performed well in gaining public's perceived approval.

Quality of Democracy in Pakistan - Public Satisfaction is High

Over the last two years, the Pakistani public has been able to see glimpses of the state of democracy in the country. Crucially, the democratic transition from the PPP Government to the PML-N Government was a landmark event in the country's history. This peaceful and stable transfer of power from one democratic Government to another has given the Pakistani public an opportunity to begin assessing and engaging with democratic institutions and functions in the country. Moreover, as the country's democratic experience deepens, the people of Pakistan are beginning to understand

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and analyse the core indicators and norms that democratic Governments must adhere to, in order to make democracy more transparent, legitimate, and effective.

The difference in approval ratings on specific indicators shows that the people of Pakistan support the overall democratic architecture that has been built over the past few years. Specifically, the people of Pakistan are happy with the overall democratic dispensation, and favour democratic governance. However, specific indicators of democratic functioning still generate low approval rates. This implies that the people of Pakistan, while favouring the democratic infrastructure and overarching democratic norms in the country, still wish to see improvement on the operational aspects of democratic governance.

High Approval of Media, Weak Assessment of Bureaucracy

Public opinion on second year of democratic performance indicates that the Pakistani public has clearly distinguished between strengths and weaknesses of the democratic system. The people of Pakistan have begun forming linkages with their favoured political parties and their political agendas. The current democratic order in the country gained the highest approval rates on the **Overall Quality of Democracy (66%)**, **Independence of Media (**Government's and Media Performance: **64%)** and **Trust in Favourite Political Party (56%)**. This signals a welcome change in Pakistan's socio-political discourse and politics. Pakistan's media and political parties, the principal institutions and agents of democratic functioning, norms, and practices in the country, enjoy strong public trust and confidence. This development augurs well for the future of democratic evolution and probability of democratic consolidation in the country.

In contrast, the lowest approval rate on the current democratic system in the country was registered on (For the Government's Performance "34%; for the Bureaucracy's Performance: 33%). This low Approval Rating is indicative of the lack of transfusion of independence, democratic accountability and transparency in the civil services in Pakistan. Critically, the machinery of governance, i.e., bureaucracy, is rated negatively by the people of Pakistan. This implies that while democratic norms and architecture are strengthening in Pakistan, the tool for delivering effective democratic policies remains ineffective. Specifically, the indicator assessed here analyses the impartial, objective, effective, and subordinate functioning of Civil Services under the Constitution and laws of the State. Low approval on this indicator is reflective of the need for democratic Governments in Pakistan to undertake bureaucratic reforms in order to deliver effective and improved governance to the people of Pakistan.

The best and worst rated Quality of Democracy Indicators here are also indicative of another important emerging feature of Pakistani politics and democracy: while the people of Pakistan have developed a confidence in media and trust-based link with their political parties, thereby indicating a commitment to democratic norms in principle, the democratic Governments need to improve their performance via reforming the bureaucratic machinery in order to bring positive and palpable reforms to the people of Pakistan.

Democracy Scores: National Scores vs. Provincial Scores

The scores given in Table 4 compare the National and Provincial scores on the Quality of Democracy at the Federal level. This comparison shows how each province views the current democratic dispensation nationwide and its performance on core democratic indicators.

Table 4 provides an insight into how residents in each province of the country view the overall functioning and performance of democracy in the country.

Punjab and Balochistan differ in their lowest approval rating of the Quality of Democracy Indicators. In Balochistan, the **lowest approval** was registered on **Respect for Human Rights (28%)**; a perennial and somewhat legitimate concern of the people of Balochistan, while in Punjab the least approval was registered on **Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy** (31%).

An important point to note here is the **high approval rate** on **Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet (58%)** recorded in **Balochistan**. This score supports the idea that the people of Balochistan are increasingly becoming more comfortable with the democratic set-up at the Federal level, and are fully supportive of retaining a democratic political system in the

country.

The lowest approval rate in Sindh was also recorded on Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy (32%). Moreover Safeguarding Sovereignty of the State (36%) was rated poorly by the people of Sindh. The only high Approval Ratings were registered on Independence of Media (72%) and Overall Quality of Democracy (69%).

This pervasive and prevailing negativity in Balochistan and Sindh must alert the national and political leadership to the resentment and pessimism brewing in these provinces. The people in Balochistan are deeply dissatisfied with the current system of political governance, as well as the actual delivery of governance in the province. However, the silver lining remains in the independence of media and Supreme Court in both provinces. Despite the overall negativity on most quality of democracy indicators, the people of Sindh are still expectant that an independent media and Supreme Court will successfully translate democratic support from the people into effective and transparent improvements in governance.

KP, followed by Punjab, has emerged as the province with the highest approval rating on the democratic system in the country.

The people of KP gave the highest approval to Trust in Favourite Political Party (82%). This rating can be taken as

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evidence for strong support for the current system of democracy, as well as its qualitative performance over the last two years.

The only **low rating** from the province was recorded on **Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy (44%)**. Given the lower approval ratings on this indicator from all four provinces, including Punjab, democratic governments at the centre and in provinces should invest their focus and energies into reforming the bureaucratic institutional infrastructure in the country.

Detailed Scores on Indicators of Democracy

Evolution of Democracy: 45% Provide High Approval Rating

45% of the respondents believe that the country is getting its democratic evolution mostly on the right track. This proportion of respondents rated the current democratic system in the country between 6 and 10 (on a scale of 1-10; a score of 1 being "Highly Undemocratic" and a score of 10 being "Highly Democratic"). 39% of the respondents rate the current democratic system more apprehensively by rating the current democratic system in the country between 1 and 5 (exclusive of 5).

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


Figure 4: Trust in Institutions (Approval Ratings 2015)

Respondents from across Pakistan were asked to assert their level of trust on major national institutions. The data presented in Table 4 provides an indication of the most and least trusted institutions in the country.

The Supreme and High Courts of Pakistan earned a strong approval rating of 62%, thus emerging as the most trustworthy institution. Pakistanis stated that they trusted the Supreme/High Courts "a lot" to "somewhat."

Similarly, Pakistan's burgeoning print and electronic media is also seen as one of the most trustworthy institution, with a positive approval rating of 55% and 53% respectively.

In contrast to the robust trust embedded in the higher courts of the country by the people of Pakistan, subordinate Civil Courts in the country managed an approval rating of only 43%. Pakistan's Political Parties in general received the lowest approval rating of the institutions covered in this poll: 35%. This contrasts with the trust in the 'Favourite Political Party' which scored a 56%.

It was also disappointing to see that institutions such as the National Assembly and the Election Commission, that may be considered the bastions of a democracy, could not retain high-level of public's trust

Perceptions of Election 2013: 59% have confidence in the fairness of elections

A substantial 59% of all Pakistanis believe that the General Election in 2013 was somewhat to completely transparent and fair. For the survey conducted at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 63% of respondents stated that General Election 2013 was somewhat to completely fair and transparency.

In contrast, 30% respondents see the Election as somewhat to completely rigged, whereas for the survey conducted at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 37% of the respondents believed this to be the case.

Need for Reforms in the ECP: 70% think it is crucial

An overwhelming majority of Pakistanis, 70%, believe that it is somewhat to very important that the Election

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Commission of Pakistan's functions need to be reformed and reconfigured, while only 11% did not consider these changes necessary.

However, for the survey conducted after the 1st year of the elected Governments, 85% of the respondents believed that it was somewhat to very important to reform and reconfigure the Election Commission of Pakistan, and 10% believed that this was not important at all.

Prospects of Fair Election in Future: 38% are hopeful of improved performance by the ECP

In the context of the need for reforms and changes in the ECP, 38% Pakistanis believe that the next elections will be conducted in a much better fashion by the Election Commission of Pakistan, whereas for the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, this figure stood at 30%.

Additionally, at the end of the 2nd year of the elected Governments, 11% Pakistanis have serious doubts about the Election Commission and believe that the ECP will fare worse in the next elections. 21% of all Pakistanis believe that the ECP's performance at holding free and fair elections in the country will be no different in the future.

Quality of Democracy: Views of Respondents from All Over Pakistan

Public Opinion on the Quality of Democracy: 66% provide a positive Approval Rating

According to the survey, 66% gave a high Approval Rating while 27% did not respond positively regarding the issue of quality of democracy in the country.

Public Opinion on the Independence of Media: 64% provide a positive Approval Rating

Regarding the Government's performance on maintaining freedom and independence of media 64% provided a high rating and 22% provided low Approval Rating. For the same issue, respondents were also asked how they rated the performance of media itself. 64% gave a high Approval Rating on the media's performance at maintaining its independence while 22% gave a low rating.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Supreme Court

Respondents were asked regarding the effectiveness of the Supreme Court. 55% gave a high approval rating to the Government's performance at making the Supreme Court stronger and more independent while 24% gave a low approval rating. With regards to the Supreme Court's performance at making itself strong and independent, 56% of the public gave a high approval rating while 23% gave a low approval rating.

Public Opinion on the Transfer of Powers at Provincial Level: 44% provide high approval rating According to the survey 44% of the public gave a positive response to the transfer of powers at the provincial level while 27% gave a low rating in this regard.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the National Assembly: 48% provide high approval rating

According to the survey, 48% of the respondents gave high approval ratings to the Government's performance at making the National Assembly stronger and independent. On the other hand, 26% gave low approval ratings.

Likewise when respondents were asked about the National Assembly's performance at making itself stronger, 45% gave high approval ratings and 30% gave low ratings. 25% did not respond.

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Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet: 52% provide high approval rating

People seemed to be dissatisfied with the effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet overall, with 52% giving high ratings and 29% giving low ratings. 19% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Democratic Checks on the Military: 51% provide high approval rating

51% gave a high rating to the Government's performance at keeping the Armed Forces answerable to it as part of the democratic process in the country; 26% gave low ratings. Of those who gave a positive response however, only 10% said that the Government's performance in this regard was 'Very Good' while 41% said that it was 'Good'.

Public Opinion on the Constitutional Supremacy over Bureaucracy: 33% provide high approval rating

The Government's performance at ensuring the constitutional supremacy over Bureaucracy has not been satisfactory, according to the public verdict. Only 33% gave a high approval rating while 34% gave a low approval rating. With regards to Bureaucracy's performance at following the constitution only 33% gave a high approval rating while another 33% gave a low approval rating.

Public Opinion on the Respect for Human Rights: 47% provide high approval rating

The public opinion about the Government's performance regarding respect of human rights in the country is unsatisfactory with only 47% giving a high rating and with 44% giving low approval ratings.

Public Opinion on the Safeguarding Sovereignty of the State: 43% provide high approval rating

Regarding sovereignty and the interference of outside powers in the country, the Government received high ratings from 43% and low approval ratings from 35% of the public.















Question: During the past two years, with regards to becoming stronger and more independent, please tell us if the Supreme Court's performance been very good, good, bad or very bad till now?



























Question: Is the level of trust that you possess in your favourite political party very high, high, low, or very low? (Regarding its honesty and capacity to run the country)





Public Opinion on the Quality of Democracy - 54% provide a high approval rating

According to the survey, 54% gave a high approval rating while 42% gave a low rating to the Government regarding the issue of quality of governance through democracy. Of those who gave their approval, only 8% said that the quality of governance through democratic means is 'Very Good' while 46% said that it was 'Good'.

Public Opinion on the Independence of Media

52% provided a positive rating for the government's performance at maintaining the independence of media while 30% provided a low approval rating. 18% did not respond.

Regarding the media's performance at maintaining its freedom of expression and independence 52% provided a high approval rating while 31% gave a low approval rating.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Supreme Court

Regarding the government's performance in making the Supreme Court stronger and more independent 52% of the public gave positive rating while 30% gave low approval rating. 19% did not respond.

When respondents were asked about the Supreme Court's performance at making itself stronger and independent, 60% gave a high approval rating and 21% gave a low rating.

Public Opinion on the Transfer of Powers at Provincial Level - 45% provide a high approval rating

According to the survey 45% of the public gave positive ratings to the transfer of powers at the provincial level while 35% gave low ratings. 21% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the National Assembly

The public seemed to be marginally satisfied with the government's performance at making the National Assembly stronger and more independent. 51% of the respondents gave high ratings while 27% gave low ratings.

With regards to the National Assembly's performance

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at making itself independent, 51% provided a high approval rating while 32% provided a low rating.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet - 68% provide a high approval rating

With regards to the effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet overall, 58% of the public gave high approval ratings and 28% gave low ratings.

Public Opinion on the Democratic Checks on the Military - 47% provide a high approval rating

The public has divided opinion regarding the issue of democratic checks on the military, with 46% giving the Government a positive rating over this issue and 40% giving a low rating.

Public Opinion on Effectiveness of the Bureaucracy

The Government's performance on the issue of the effectiveness of the executive has not been satisfactory, according to the public verdict. Only 32% gave a positive approval rating while 48% gave a low rating. 20% did not respond.

Likewise with regards to the bureaucracy's performance at following the constitution only 34% gave a high approval rating while 44% gave a low approval rating.

Public Opinion on the Respect for Human Rights - 28% provide high approval rating

The public opinion about the Government's performance regarding respect of human rights in the country is negative overall. Among the respondents, only 28% gave a high rating while 65% gave a low rating.

Public Opinion on the Sovereignty - 34% provide high approval rating

Regarding sovereignty and the interference of outside powers in the country, the Government received positive rating from 34% and a weak rating from 47% of the public. Of those who gave their approval, only 6% said that the government's performance at maintaining its sovereignty is 'Very Good' while 29% said that it is 'Good.'







































Question: Is the level of trust that you possess in your favourite political party very high, high, low, or very low? (Regarding its honesty and capacity to run the country)



Public Verdict on the Quality of Democracy - 73% provide high approval rating

According to the survey, 73% gave a high approval rating while 21% gave a low rating to the Government regarding the issue of quality of governance through democracy. 6% did not respond.

Public verdict on the Independence of Media

The public has an overall positive opinion regarding the current government's performance at maintaining the freedom of expression of media with 68% providing a high approval rating and 18% providing a low approval rating.

Regarding the media's performance at maintaining its freedom, 67% of the public gave a high approval rating while 20% gave a low approval rating. 14% did not respond.

Public verdict on the Effectiveness of the Supreme Court

The public verdict on the government's performance at ensuring effectiveness of the Supreme Court is positive with 64% of the public giving a high approval rating and 18% giving a low approval rating. 17% did not respond.

According to the survey, 62% of the respondents gave positive ratings to the government's performance at ensuring effectiveness of the National Assembly. On the other hand, 20% are not satisfied with it giving it lower ratings.

Likewise, when respondents were asked to rate the

National Assembly's performance, 59% gave high approval ratings while 23% gave low approval ratings.

Public verdict on the Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet - 62% provide a high approval rating

People seemed to be satisfied with the effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet overall, with a high approval rating of 63% and a low approval rating of 21%.

Public verdict on the Democratic Checks on the Military - 61% provide a high approval rating

Most people believe that there are enough democratic checks on the military, with 61% giving the Government a positive rating over this issue and 25% giving a poor rating.

Public verdict on the Constitutional Supremacy over the Bureaucracy

The Government's performance on the issue of the effectiveness of the Executive has not been satisfactory, according to the public verdict. 44% gave a high approval rating while 32% gave a low approval rating. 24% did not respond.

With regards to the bureaucracy's performance at abiding by the constitution, only 45% of the public have high approval ratings while 31% gave low approval ratings.

Public verdict on the Respect for Human Rights - 54% provide a high approval rating

































Public Opinion on the Quality of Democracy - 65% provide a high approval rating

According to the survey, 65% gave a high approval rating while 27% gave a low rating to the Government regarding the issue of quality of governance through democracy. Of those who gave a positive rating, 10% said that the quality of governance is 'Very Good' while 55% said that it is 'Good'.

Public Opinion on the Independence of Media

62% provided a high approval rating for the government's performance at ensuring independence of media while 22% provided a low approval rating. 15% did not respond.

Regarding the media's performance at maintaining its own independence 62% of the public gave a high approval rating while 23% gave a low approval rating.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Supreme Court

The public opinion on the government's performance at ensuring the independence and effectiveness of Supreme Court is marginally positive with 51% of the public giving a high approval rating and 22% giving a low approval rating. 27% did not respond.

Regarding the Supreme Court's performance at ensuring its own independence 52% of the public gave high approval ratings while 22% gave low approval ratings.

Public Opinion on the Transfer of Powers at Provincial Level - 41% provide high approval rating

According to the survey 41% of the public gave positive ratings to the transfer of powers at the provincial level while 22% gave low approval ratings. Public opinion is thus divided in this regard.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the National Assembly

According to the survey, 43% of the respondents gave high approval ratings to the government's performance at ensuring effectiveness of the National Assembly. On the other hand, 24% are not satisfied with it.

With regards to the National Assembly's performance 41% of the respondents gave high approval rating while 26% gave low approval ratings. 33% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet - 47% gave high approval rating

People seemed to be satisfied with the effectiveness of the Federal Cabinet overall, with a 47% positive rating while 28% gave a low approval rating. 25% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Democratic Checks on the Military - 50% provide a high approval rating

Most people believe that there are enough democratic checks on the military, with 50% giving the Government a positive rating over this issue. On the other hand, 20% gave a low approval rating and 30% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Constitutional Supremacy over Bureaucracy

The Government's performance on the issue of the effectiveness of the Executive has not been satisfactory, according to the Public Opinion. 30% gave a high approval rating on the Government's performance in this regard while 27% gave a low rating. A large proportion (44%) of the public however did not respond.

With regards to the bureaucracy's performance in adhering to the constitution, 31% respondents gave a high approval rating while 24% gave a low approval rating. 44% did not respond.

























Question: Is the level of trust that you possess in your favourite political party very high, high, low, or very low? (Regarding its honesty and capacity to run the country)



Public Opinion on the Quality of Democracy - 70% provide high approval rating

According to the survey, 70% gave a high approval rating while 27% gave a low rating regarding the issue of quality of governance through democracy. Of those who gave their approval, only 14% said that the quality of governance through democratic means is 'Very Good' while 56% said that it was 'Good'.

Public Opinion on the Independence of Media

72% provided a high approval rating for Government's performance in ensuring independence of media while 21% provided a low approval rating. 7% did not know. Likewise, 74% provided a high approval rating on the media's performance and 21% gave it a low approval rating. 4% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the Supreme Court - 59% provide positive rating

Regarding the government's performance in making the Supreme Court stronger and more independent 59% of the public gave high approval rating while 31% gave a low rating. 10 % did not know and 1% did not respond. With regards to the Supreme Court's performance at ensuring its strength and independence, 63% respondents gave a high approval rating and 29% gave a low approval rating. 7% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Transfer of Powers at Provincial Level - 43% provide high approval rating

According to the survey 43% of the public gave high ratings to the transfer of powers at the provincial level while 36% gave low ratings. 18% did not know and 3% did not respond.

Public Opinion on the Effectiveness of the National Assembly

Only 32% gave a high rating while a staggering 66% gave low ratings.17% did not know and 4% did not respond. 









Question: During the past two years, with regards to becoming stronger and more independent, please tell us if the Supreme Court's performance been very good, good, bad or very bad till now?

















Detailed Scores on Indicators of Democracy

Overall Performance of the Prime Minister: 73% provide positive Approval Rating

73% respondents provided positive rating to Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's overall performance over the past 2 years. Breakdown of the Approval Rating further reveals that 21% respondents rated Prime Minister's performance as 'Very Good' while 52% rated it as 'Good'. On the other hand 24% rated his performance poorly with 18% saying that Nawaz Sharif's performance has been 'Bad' and 6% saying that his performance has been 'Very Bad'. 4% did not respond.

Interestingly, the Approval Rating for the overall performance of the Prime Minister stood at 46% for the survey conducted at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments.

Public Trust in Democracy: 58% of the Respondents have High Confidence in Democracy

58% Pakistanis report that they are somewhat to strongly satisfied with current democratic system in the country. However, a strong 33% said that they were somewhat to strongly dissatisfied with democracy at this point in time. For the democracy survey conducted at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 55% of the respondents stated that they were somewhat to strongly satisfied with the current democratic system in the country.

Democracy vs. other Systems

A substantial 64% of the respondents believes that democratically elected Governments constitute the best system for Pakistan. Crucially, the popular appetite for another Army rule in the country remains low – only 20% Pakistanis see another military rule as the best system for the country.

For the democracy survey conducted by PILDAT at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 67% of the respondents stated that that democratically elected governments constitute the best system for Pakistan. Similarly, at the end of the 1st year, only 19% of the respondents stated that another military rule would be good for the country.

Respondents were also asked if they preferred Democracy or Dictatorship in governance. An overwhelming majority of 72% said that they preferred democracy while 15% preferred dictatorship and 13% did not respond.




Figure 60: Trust in Institutions (Approval Ratings 2015)

Evolution of Democracy: 45% provide positive rating

45% Pakistanis believe that the country is getting its democratic evolution mostly on the right track. This proportion of respondents rated the current democratic system in the country between 6 and 10 (on a scale of 1-10; a score of 1 being "Highly Undemocratic" and a score of 10 being "Highly Democratic"). 39% of the country's population rates the current democratic system more apprehensively by rating the current democratic system in the country between 1 and 5 (exclusive of 5).

On the other hand, for the democracy survey conducted by PILDAT at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 47% of the respondents stated that democratic evolution was mostly on the right track, whereas 53% rated the democratic system more apprehensively.

Respondents from across Pakistan were asked to assert their level of approval in terms of how democratic major national institutions were. The data presented in Table 65 provides an indication of the most and least trusted institutions in the country.

Pakistan's highly respected Armed Forces are seen as

the most trustworthy institution, with an approval rating of 75 %. Pakistanis stated that they trusted the armed forces "a lot" to "somewhat".

Similarly, the Supreme and High Courts of Pakistan earned a strong approval rating of 63% while the Print and Electronic Media, both significant arms of the media industry also generated high approval ratings of 55% and 54% respectively. The National Assembly was characteristic of an approval rating of 49%, followed by the Civil Courts at 43%. The Election Commission of Pakistan, currently embroiled in the middle of the national political crisis, was able to earn an approval rating of 37%.

In contrast to the robust trust in the Armed Forces and media by the people of Pakistan, political parties and the police had lower ratings of 36% and 32 % respectively.

Perceptions of Election 2013: 59% have confidence in the fairness of elections

A substantial 59% of all Pakistanis believe that the General Election in 2013 was somewhat to completely transparent and fair. On the contrast 30% respondents see the Election as somewhat to completely rigged.

For the democracy survey conducted at the end of the 1st year of the elected Governments, 53% of the respondents believed that General Election 2013 were completely to somewhat transparent and fair and 37% thought they were somewhat to completely rigged.

Need for Reforms in the ECP: 70% think it is critical

The overwhelming majority of Pakistanis, 70%, believe that it is important that the Election Commission of Pakistan's functions need to be reformed and reconfigured, while only 11% did not consider these changes necessary. By the end of the 1st year, 85% of the respondents believed that reforms in the ECP were very to somewhat important.

Prospects of Fair Election in Future: 38% have confidence in improved performance by ECP In the context of the need for reforms and changes in the

In the context of the need for reforms and changes in the ECP, 38% Pakistanis believe that the next elections will be conducted in a much better fashion by the Election Commission of Pakistan. However, 11% Pakistanis have serious doubts about the Election Commission and believe that the ECP will fare worse in the next

elections. 21% of all Pakistanis believe that the ECP's performance at holding free and fair elections in the country will be no different in the future.

Local Government Elections: 80 % consider Important

A substantial 80% of the population says that holding Local Government elections are somewhat to very important. Only 11% of the country's population believes that holding local elections is not very important or not important at all.

Local Government System: 72% Support

The majority of Pakistanis (72%) believe that a locally elected Government is somewhat to very important in solving the problems faced by ordinary Pakistanis. Only 19% Pakistanis asserted that local Governments are not important in resolving the problems faced by common people.

A review of the current leadership of the country shows that the people of Pakistan have contrasting views on the most favourable leaders in the country in terms of how democratic they are.

Of the political leadership in the country, Nawaz Sharif






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emerged as the most popular political leader with an approval rating of 75 % (22 % rated the Prime Minister of the country as Very Good and 53 % voted for him as Good).

Shahbaz Sharif is not far behind his brother at an approval rating of 72 % while General Raheel Sharif and Pervez Musharraf, two figures at the forefront of political discussions these days, are characteristic of ratings of 69% and 51% respectively. Mr. Imran Khan, Chairman PTI, has garnered an approval of 49%.

Other national political leaders that the poll included had relatively lower ratings. Altaf Hussain emerged as the least popular leader in Pakistan with an approval rating of 13% (5% of the population rated him as Very Good while 8 % voted him as Good). Chaudhry Shujaat Hussain also earned substantially lower ratings at 19 %, followed closely by Asfandyar Wali at 18%. Dr. Tahir Ul Qadri and Asif Zardari earned a similarly weak approval of 21%.

Respondents from across Pakistan were asked to evaluate the democratic performance of major national political parties in the country. The results indicate that the people of Pakistan largely negatively evaluate the majority of the country's political parties.


The Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) had the highest approval amongst the population, with 70% of the respondents rating the party's competence as Very Good (19%) to Good (51%). The Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf followed with a difference of 25 % at a rating of 44% (12% of respondents from across Pakistan rated the party's competence as Very Good and 32% rated it as Good). The Jamat-i-Islami and the PPP were approved of by 40% and 36% of the respondents respectively.

In contrast, all other political parties included in this

poll generated relatively lower approval levels of their competence. The MQM emerged as the most negatively rated political party in the country with an approval rating 14% (4 % of respondents rated it as "Very Good" and 10 % rated it as "Good"). Dr. Tahirul-Qadri's PAT received a relatively low rating at 19%, the ANP was favourably voted for by 21% and the JUI-F had only slightly higher approval ratings at 23%.

The National Assembly received the highest rating regarding its function of law making with 55% respondents giving a high approval rating on the issue. In all of its other functions however, the National Assembly received low ratings.42% gave the Assembly a high approval rating on improving relations between the Federal Government and Opposition, 40% gave it a high approval rating on Oversight of Government actions, and only 39% gave a high approval rating on the Prime Minister's attendance

in the National Assembly.

Provincial Assemblies' Ratings on Legislation

KP's Provincial Assembly achieved the highest rating for its democratic performance, with an approval rating of 65 %, with 29 % of respondents rating it as Very Good and 36 % voting for it as Good.

Balochistan followed the KP in terms of approval ratings, with a 56 % rating of approval (13 % rated the Provincial Assembly's performance as Very Good and 43 % rated it as Good).

In Punjab, 51% of the respondents rated the Provincial Assembly's performance at legislating as Very Good or Good.

In Sindh, 47% of the respondents rated the performance of their Provincial Assembly at legislation as Very Good to Good. The Sindh Assembly had the least

Figure 64: Provincial Assemblies' Ratings on Legislation




Provincial Legislature – Chief Minister's attendance and involvement in the Provincial Assembly-

KP's Chief Minister's attendance at the Provincial Assembly's sessions was rated most positively out of the four provinces, with 60% rating the Chief Minister's attendance and involvement in the Provincial Assembly as Very Good or Good.

Balochistan's Chief Minister had positive ratings of 56% (Very Good or Good) at attending and engaging with the Provincial Legislature, while Punjab's Chief Minister had approval ratings of 41%.

The Chief of Minister of Sindh was rated as Very Good or Good by 33% of the respondents from Sindh (the least positive rating on this indicator) for his attendance at and involvement with the Provincial Assembly's sessions in Karachi.




Figure 66: Ratings on the Chief Ministers' Attendance



Internal Democracy in Political Parties

The **PML-N**'s internal democracy quotient was assessed positively by a majority of the country. 60% Pakistanis believe that the party has internal democracy ranging from some to a very great extent. 26% disagreed and claimed that the PML-N has very little to no democracy in its internal party structures and operations.

In comparison, 43% of Pakistanis believe that **PTI** has some to substantial internal democratic practices, rules, and norms. In contrast, 36% Pakistanis believe that the PTI has very little to no internal democratic practices or structures.

With regards to the PPP, a 53% majority of Pakistanis

opined that the party has very little to no internal democracy. However, a significant 33% disagreed and stated that the PPP has an internal democratic order ranging from some to a very large extent.

55% of all Pakistanis assessed the **MQM** as a party has very little to no internal democracy, while only 15% respondents disagreed with this negative assessment.

49% Pakistanis reported that they think that the **PML-Q** has very little to no internal democracy, while only 21% disagreed with notion.

43% of all Pakistanis assessed the **JUI-F** to have very little to no internal democracy, while only 21% respondents disagreed with this negative assessment.

38% of all Pakistanis believe that the **ANP** has very little to no democracy at all, while only 20% respondents believe the party has internal democracy.

38% Pakistanis see the **JI** to have very good levels of internal democracy while 27% of all Pakistanis disagree with this.

The **PAT** is assessed positively on account of having internal democracy by only 17% of the respondents **and** 45% of all Pakistanis assessed the party as having very little to no internal democracy at all.

Treatment of Religious and Ethnic Minorities: 50%

provide positive ratings to the Federal Government 50% rated the Federal Government's performance as "Good" to "Very Good" on this metric, while 36% Pakistanis saw the Government's performance as "Bad" to "Very Bad".

Collective Performance of the Federal Cabinet - 39% provide positive ratings

Over the past year, 34% Pakistanis rated the Federal Cabinet's performance as Bad or Very Bad in framing policies to resolve national issues and crises. On the other hand 39% Pakistanis rated the Federal Cabinet's performance as "Good" or "Very Good" on this indicator.

Collective Performance of the Provincial Cabinets - 38% provide positive ratings

Over the last year, a significant 37% Pakistanis rated their Provincial Cabinet's performance as Bad or Very Bad in framing policies to resolve national issues and crises. 38% Pakistanis rated the Provincial Cabinet's performance as "Good" or "Very Good" on this indicator.

The province-wise distribution of the Provincial Cabinet's performance on framing policies to resolve issues and crises is shown in Table 72.

The Provincial Cabinet in KP received the highest positive rating of the four provinces, in its performance at framing policies to overcome various challenges. 52% of the respondents rated the KP Provincial Cabinet's performance as Very Good or Good on this function.

38% of the respondents from Punjab rated their Provincial Cabinet's performance at forming policies to overcome problems as Very Good or Good.

45% of the respondents from Balochistan rated their Provincial Cabinet's performance as Very Good to Good on this count.





Question: On the whole, how satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the type of democracy in the Pakistan?



Question: What is your opinion of Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's overall performance over the past two years?



Question: In your opinion, which system of Government is best for the country?



Question: Personally which one do you prefer from dictatorship and democracy?



Question: On a scale of 1-10, where would you rate democratic system in our country? "1" being Extremely Undemocratic and "10" being Extremely Democratic?



















Question: Please tell us how important it is to institute reforms in the way Election Commission of Pakistan works?





Question: How important do you think it is to hold Local Government (union councils, etc.) elections?



Question: How much do you think Local Governments (Union Councils etc.) helps in solving the problems of the common people?













































Research Methodology

Sampling Methodology

1. Sample Size

The sample size for this survey is 3231 Men and Women

2. Coverage & Exclusion

The sample covered 56 Districts of Pakistan. The sample was spread out and covered all Four Provinces of Pakistan namely: Punjab, Sindh, KP and Balochistan

About 5% of Population living in FATA, GB and AJK was not part of the Universe for this survey due to security reasons as well as inability to perform Random Sampling methodology.

3. Sampling Stages

a. Definitions

Sampling Frame

The Sampling Frame for the sampling of this survey was based on Electoral Lists updated for 2013 General Election. The Polling Station breakdown and list of polling stations was obtained from the Election Commission of Pakistan's website. The electoral lists for sampled polling stations were requested and obtained from the Election Commission office in Islamabad in hard copy form on payment.

PSU

The Primary Sampling Unit for this survey was the polling station

SSU

The Secondary Sampling Unit for this survey was the respondent (Male or Female) randomly chosen from the Electoral Rolls.

b. Sampling Stages

Stage 1: Pakistan's National Assembly is composed of 272 National Assembly constituencies. These 272 seats are spread across 4 Provinces and FATA according to population share. Systematic Random Sampling (SRS) method was used to select 55 constituencies from the list of 272.

3 Constituencies falling in FATA region were dropped due to Security concerns in FATA

.Stage 2: From the selected 52 Constituencies (after dropping the 3 FATA constituencies) all the Polling Stations in these 52 constituencies were listed. 4 Polling Stations were selected through Simple Random Sampling (SRS).

In other words a total of 208 Polling Stations were selected falling within these 52 Constituencies.

Since Size of Electoral Constituencies in Pakistan is not uniform and can range from 100,000 voters to 600,000 voters, this method of Systematic Random Sample gave a slight over weight to smaller constituencies at the cost of the bigger constituencies. This can be considered as one of the limitations of the current sampling exercise

Stage 3: The Polling Stations were categorised into Rural and Urban polling stations with available data from the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics.

Stage 4: For each of the 3 provinces (Punjab, Sindh and KP) 16 interviews were planned in each of the PSUs, i.e., Polling Stations. In Balochistan, 24 Interviews were planned in each of the PSUs, i.e., Polling Stations.

Stage 5: Once polling station and sample to be covered per polling station was available, two separate procedures happened depending on the availability of Electoral Rolls or Voter Lists.

PSUs where Electoral Rolls were available: 12 Male names and 12 female names were drawn from the electoral rolls using Systematic Random Sampling Approach. In Balochistan Province, where interviews per PSU were 24, 18 male and 18 female names were generated from the Electoral rolls of the relevant PSU, i.e., Polling Station.

Using the address and name available, the required respondent was searched by interviewers. In case of lack of availability of selected person, the person was replaced with another one from the 24 (or 36 in Balochistan) available with the interviewer. In other words, substitution of respondent was handled by drawing an oversample from the list.

A total of 24 Constituencies (out of 52) followed this method. In other word, around half of the sample survey responses followed this method.

PSUs where Electoral Rolls were either unavailable or were found to be incomplete.

In these PSUs, a Random Walk Approach with a Random Starting Point was used. The interviewer first listed all the available landmarks around the Polling Station. He/She used a random number generator to select one random location and then used Right Hand Rule to select first Household. Within the Household selected, KISH Grid was used to select a Random member of the HH and was interviewed.

In case of lack of availability of the selected person the entire HH was replaced instead of interviewing from the same HH.

A total of 28 Constituencies (our of 52) followed this method.

The achieved sample is very close to National Demographics as measured in the Census of 1998 and Demographic Profile emerging from the Pakistan Social and Living Measurement Survey (PSLM 2013-14).

However, there are a few deviations in Provinces (Balochistan has been given a larger representation, almost twice its size, Punjab's share has been reduced by about 4 percentage points). Similarly, the profile of this sample is slightly more youthful than the National Demographics and also slightly less educated than the National demographics.

Weighting of Data

Since the deviation in Sample Profile and National Demographics is deemed by PILDAT to be not very large, data has not been weighted and the figures reported in this study are based on the Sample Profile shared above.

Disclaimer: The Urban / Rural division of Polling stations has been done based on the available information. In some areas polling stations have mixed populations, i.e., Urban as well as Rural Households. An estimation has been used to put these Mixed Polling Stations into Urban or Rural if greater population lived in either Urban or Rural. In other words, a small minority of Households in Rural areas may have been categorised into Urban respondents and vice versa. It is assumed as one of the crucial limitations of the current sampling approach.

5. Error Margin Calculation

The Error Margin for this survey is calculated to range between +-2-5 % at 95% Confidence Interval.

Due to larger cluster size at the PSU level (16 and 24), the design effect for the study would be slightly larger than 10 interviews per PSU which is generally the norm for polling in Pakistan.

6. Field Work Force

A mixed team of Male and Female Interviewers was used.

The total team comprised 74 individuals

The basic qualification for interviewers was Graduation, mostly unemployed people were selected but about 50% were experienced in interviewing.

7. Field Dates

The field work for this survey was conducted during June 02 – June 12, 2015.

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8. Other Protocols followed

Briefing/Training of interviewers:

Briefings were organised for the interviewers on the designed questionnaire in two days training sessions at each Provincial Capital (Lahore, Karachi, Peshawar and Quetta). The interviewers were instructed on measures such as:

- 1. Following Sampling/Quota Instructions Properly
- 2. Ethical Code of Conduct towards interviewers
- 3. Following skipping Instructions and other interview instructions on the Questionnaire
- 4. Maintaining Neutrality in asking Questions

Mock Calls

After the briefings were completed, all the field workers made mock calls under the direct supervision of an executive or a fieldwork supervisor. This ensured that the field workers properly understood the instructions and could handle various interviewing problems during the interview (in the field). After completion of mock calls, a debriefing session was arranged in which the problems faced by the interviewers during the mock interviews were discussed and solutions suggested and recorded.

Initial Checking/ Intake Edit

After the training, the interviewers went into the field for actual interviewing. A team comprising one male interviewer and one female interviewer worked under the supervision of a Field Supervisor. Field Supervisors observed at least 3 interviews of each interviewer for quality assurance. In case the work of an interviewer was not acceptable, he/she was disengaged from the survey. Field Supervisor was responsible to check the filled-in questionnaires before passing them to Data Coding/Entry department. The problems or missing information identified during field edit were explained to the relevant interviewer and he/she was instructed to rectify them either through telephone and/or revisit the respondent for clarification and reasking the missing questions.

Supervision & Back Checking

Interviewers were supervised on the job and the work done by them was back checked. At least 20% back checking was done on work completed by each interviewer to ensure authenticity of data.

Data Entry and Verification

Once the questionnaires were received from the field, those were checked and the responses of open-ended questions were coded with the help of a code list.

After the coding of open-ended responses, data was entered into computers. PILDAT used the SPSS data entry programme that has flexibility to implement validity checks and skipping rules, etc. At least 20 % of its entered data was rechecked for the quality assurance.

After completion of data entries, all data was cleaned by using a data-cleaning program written in SPSS which is customized for every project according to the survey/questionnaire needs. Data was thoroughly checked for an omission, displacements and other error resulting in inconsistencies with the coding scheme.
